RECTOR'S RAMBLINGS

Growing up in Oxfordshire and going to school in Oxford, I was always aware of May Day, a big occasion in the city. The day began at 6am with the choir of Magdalen College singing from the college tower (just down the road from Magdalen College School which I attended). This was followed by Morris dancing in the streets (as it happens, something I learnt to do as a boy) and more impromptu celebrations, including the tradition of jumping off Magdalen Bridge into the river below, which I have to confess to having done once!

Celebrating May Day is an ancient tradition (the choir has sung from the tower for over 500 years) with roots in the Celtic spring festival of Beltane, which means 'the return of the sun', celebrating new life and growth. It is said that the tradition of dancing round the maypole with the unwinding of intertwined ribbons symbolises the lengthening of the days as summer begins and the stomping of feet and clashing of sticks in the Morris dancing

represents the battle between good and evil and the triumph of summer over winter.

Along with the May Queen another figure which occurs in the celebrations is the dancing figure of Jack-in-the-Green, otherwise known as the Green Man. Though the Green Man is originally a pre-Christian symbol, it has been integrated into Christian imagery, and images of him began to appear in Celtic Christian manuscripts of the 8th century, including the Book of Kells and the Lindisfarne Gospels. Wooden and stone carved Green Men are found in churches throughout Britain, France and Germany, mainly dating from the 11th to 16th Centuries. Though there are none in the churches of the Windmill United Benefice, there are two fine examples in St Mary's, Bletchingley.

Celtic Christianity was deeply aware of the sacredness of creation. It was natural that it adopted the imagery of the Green Man and applied it to Christ. The intricate vines that often surround the Green Man clearly evoke the image of Christ as the true vine: I am the true vine and my father is the gardener (John 15: 1).

Later in John's Gospel when Mary meets the risen Christ we read that she supposes him to be the gardener (John 20: 15). This mistaken identity actually conveys a deep truth, that Christ is, in the words of the hymn 'Praise to the Holiest in the Height', a second Adam tending the garden of God's creation to renew it and restore it as a second paradise. The Easter season, which we are still in during most of May this year, celebrates Christ's resurrection and the resurrection not only has something to say to us about our relationship with God but also about our relationship with creation. It is not only our relationship with God which needs to be healed and restored, but also our relationship with the earth. And when I say the earth I mean the actual earth of our gardens and fields, as well as our planet which takes its name from that earth.

In short, you could say that Christians are called to be gardeners with God and the month of May is without doubt a lovely month for gardening! All this reminds me of Rudyard Kipling's poem *The Glory of the Garden*:

*Oh, Adam was a gardener, and God who made him sees
That half a proper gardener's work is done upon his knees,
So when your work is finished, you can wash your hands and pray
For the Glory of the Garden that it may not pass away!*

And so (until next month), as they say in Gardeners' Question Time, it's: 'Goodbye and good gardening!'

BURSTOW AND SMALLFIELD WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

Members and guests of Burstow and Smallfield WI were greeted by a decorated hall and tables full of sandwiches, savouries and cakes for the celebration of Burstow WI's 98th birthday. The WI in Surrey is celebrating its centenary this year and Burstow was formed two years later making it one of the oldest in the county.



Once everyone had settled down after singing Jerusalem and the announcements had been made, the curtains were drawn and the lights switched off so that Sarah Oldridge, the speaker for the day, could make her presentation. Sarah has worked at The Royal Botanic Gardens at Kew for 30 years and her talk covered the history of Kew from the mid 17th century to the present day.

Kew is sited near Richmond in Surrey and is bordered to the north by the river Thames. It in fact consists of two estates – the Richmond estate (closest to the river) and the Kew estate (Kew being derived from quay – most visitors in bygone days would have reached the gardens via boat and would have tied up at a quay). The soil at Kew is light and sandy – not ideal for horticulture – and has to constantly be enriched with compost. The present compost heap is so big it even has its own viewing platform.

George II and his wife Queen Caroline lived in the Richmond estate and their son Frederick and his wife Augusta of Saxe Gotha rented the White House in the Kew estate. Frederick and Augusta both loved gardening and after Frederick died of pneumonia, possibly brought on by gardening in the rain and then falling asleep in his wet clothes, Augusta continued with the project founding the Royal Botanic Garden in 1759. She was assisted in this project by William Aiton, the head gardener, Lord Burke as scientific advisor and William Chambers, an architect who designed many of the 39 listed buildings in the gardens. In 1761-2 the famous Pagoda which is 162ft high was erected at the cost of £12,000 – the pagoda has recently undergone a four-year restoration and reopens this summer.

When George III eventually moved into the White House with his wife Charlotte of Mecklenberg Strelitz they also had to take over Kew Palace which had been built in 1628 in order to accommodate themselves and their 15 children. The Queens Garden behind Kew Palace would have originally had alleys for walking out of the sun, a parterre garden and a nosegay garden for growing sweet smelling herbs for the posies the aristocracy would hold near their faces in order to mask the stench of the hoi poloi. This garden was re-established in the 1960s.

Joseph Banks, a friend of George III – who had become President of The Royal Society at the tender age of 30 – sent back many rare specimens from his expeditions to be cultivated at Kew. Capability Brown also got involved in landscaping at Kew.

In the 1820s the gardens fell into decline and eventually in 1840 they were handed over to the nation. Under the guidance of William Hooker who had donated his large collection of preserved plant specimens the gardens became more as we know them today. The Palm House - designed by Decimus Burton - was erected between 1844-8 and the Temperate House in 1862. When William Hooker died his son Joseph took over the job and he was later succeeded by his son-in-law. Things started to change and even women were employed as gardeners provided they dressed the same as the men in order that they were not a distraction!!

Queen Victoria gave the Queens cottage garden – with a proviso that it contained only native plants. In 1987 the Princess of Wales Conservatory with its ten different climatic zones was opened. This area has undergone restoration and will re-open this summer.

Originally it only cost a penny to get into Kew – in the good old days it was entirely funded by the government. Unfortunately it costs considerably more to visit nowadays but having given such an interesting and informative talk I am sure that Sarah will have inspired many of the WI to make the trip to the Gardens in the very near future .

It was then time for the Birthday tea – President Joan Lamb and WI Border Group Adviser Sue Sargent cut the birthday cake (*see right*) and everyone helped themselves to the buffet which had been prepared by the committee. Guests and members were then presented with a slice of birthday cake as they left.

The next meeting will be at 2.00 pm on 8 May at Smallfield Church Hall, Redehall Road, Smallfield. The speaker will be Barbara Stevens and the subject 'Charles Darwin and Downe House'.

Don't forget that Burstow and Smallfield WI will be holding a cake sale on Saturday 26 May from 9.30 - 12.00 outside Harris the Butchers in the village.

What is the Flood Action Group?

A group of local community members whose role is to identify and prioritise the many flooding problems across the Parish area, and liaise with and encourage the various Flood Risk Management Authorities to undertake the drainage work that is necessary to resolve these flooding problems.

Main Focus of Activities

Strategic – to work with the various Flood Risk Management Authorities to achieve the implementation of the:-

- Smallfield Flood Alleviation Scheme
- Upgrading of Pump Station Facilities

Drainage Network – to encourage the Flood Management and Drainage Authorities to repair, maintain and improve drainage in areas of known flooding, with an initial focus on those problems causing flooding risks to properties and safety concerns.

Ditches – to support and encourage the owners of open and piped ditches to repair, clean and maintain their ditches. Including working with local contractors to arrange machinery and provide a service to undertake ditch cleaning and maintenance.

Local Planning – to provide local knowledge on drainage matters to guide the preparation of the Neighbourhood Plan.

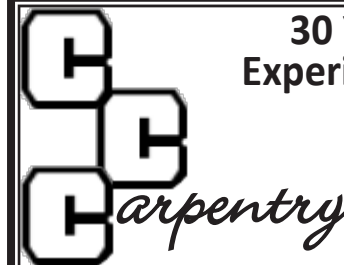

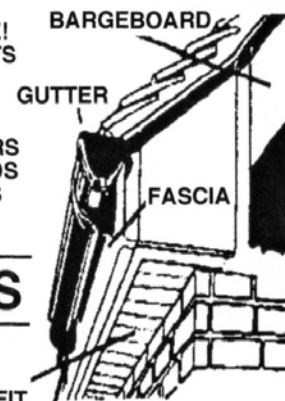
